

BLP - Noticing


When looking at 3D shapes, we use the terms vertices, edges and faces.

Edges - an edge is where two faces meet



Vertices - 'corners' where edges meet







Spelling: Use cursive handwriting to write *tion*. Use your finger to write these words that end with *tion* on the back of your other hand, your cheek or in the air!

Harder: Use a co-ordinating conjunction to write the two simple sentences as a compound sentence. Check that it makes sense!


1. Beowulf travelled far. Grendel was waiting.
