# What are the 5 W's?

• Who? Description of character (personality and appearance)

When? Description of exact times, dates or years (possibly even generic timings such as one morning.)

What! Details of what the piece is based upon-introducing a dramatic event or reporting on an event that has already happened.

Where? Description of the setting, usually includes the 5 sensesthe more descriptive, the mare it draws in the reader (creates images in the mind).

Why! the events happened. These are often evidence or fact based genres such as persuasive writing or report writing.

Listen to this part of the story, look at the key events and ask the 5 W questions, Who, What, Why, Where, When.
