

Safeguarding Special

Some information and guidance on school contact and social media

As a Headteacher I understand the frustrations that dealing with worries and concerns around school issues can have. Most things are resolved quite simply in the first instance with a quick chat with class teachers or the Pastoral Team. We are lucky as a school to have a number of talented Assistant Headteachers, responsible for year groups. In line with the communications policy they can often step in to support. Where things need more work, we have a formal complaints procedure, to map through the resolution process.

Unfortunately there can be a temptation to go straight to social media rather than speak to school. Whilst a process is still being followed it is detrimental to use social media as this carries the distinct danger of making it impossible to follow up on concerns or complaints fairly. We have seen previously that where the police are involved it can ruin or halt an investigation. As a school we take our lead from the council safeguarding team, legal team and the police.

As I have previously written, as a professional and responsible organisation, a school, or even myself as Headteacher, has no right to reply on Facebook or other social media. Anyone can tell half a story, or crop up from years ago, to write what they want, and I cannot share the inside story. Where this posting defames staff or other parents I do involve children's services, the police and council legal team.

Safe internet use, including social media workshops, will be running again for parents this year to support keeping everyone safe online.



The latest government recommendations are out for children and screen time. Government advisors are saying no more than a bonding or interaction activity up to 2 years old, e.g. on family calls with grandparent etc, and other bonding or connection activities.

For 2 to 5 year olds the recommendations are for no more than an hour of slow paced, age appropriate content. Miss Wright, our family engagement officer will be providing further information and support.
